Dear parents,

I would like to take a moment to say thank you to the students, staff and the entire George Jenkins Community for everyone's hard work and dedication. With the adjustments we needed to make for last school year, I am very proud of our accomplishments. Our students and staff continued to SOAR, and we continued to achieve despite the obstacles! As a school, we continue to strive for greatness, but that does not take away from the victories that should be celebrated, and I am *THANKFUL* to be your leader!

The bell schedule for the start of class (7:00 am) and end of school (2:00 pm) will continue to be the same. We are using a modified bell schedule which will have all 7 classes meeting each day Monday, Tuesday, and Friday then an Odd/Even block schedule will be on Wednesday and Thursday. The bell schedules will be posted on our website.

Be sure to read the entire newsletter to gather details you need to know:

- The 7-period day will be on Monday, Tuesday, and Friday.
- 1,3,5,7 (odd days) and 1,2,4,6 (even days) will be on a Wednesday and Thursday.
- The students' first school day is Monday, August 12th. The bell schedule will be a straight 7 period day for that week, and we will continue our normal schedule the following week.
- We have many opportunities for parent involvement: booster organizations, student clubs and activities, and chaperoning school-sponsored trips.
- Our continued emphasis on mathematics, science, technology, reading, arts and academies will enhance our students' abilities to be life-long learners and productive citizens.
- Please remember that supervision before/after school and at any school sponsored activity is 30 minutes before-to-30 minutes after the end of the event. Please plan accordingly to drop off or pick up your child within this time frame.
- Before school drop off and after school pick up is at the front of the school. For the safety of students and orderly flow of traffic, please do not drop off or pick up students at other locations on campus during the time between 6:30 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. These areas will be blocked off to through traffic and the gates locked.





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

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News from Student Services

Welcome to the 2024-2025 school year! Student schedules will be available at orientation on August 7th, and the first day of school is August 12th. Class changes are limited to corrections only. Remember, the GJHS Master Schedule was built on the courses that students selected at registration last spring. When scheduling students, we must adhere to the policies set forth by both the State of Florida Department of Education and the Polk County Schools. Academic course placement follows the District Progression Plan and is based on previous course, course grade, and testing data. Electives were chosen by the students at the spring registration.

State assessment scores from the May 2024 administration of the FAST ELA and End of Course (EOC) exams are updated in Student and Parent Portal. What does all of the testing mean for your student? Score achievement levels range from 1 to 5. Scores are used partially as a guide for scheduling academic levels. Any student whose score was at an achievement level below 3 must have interventions in their schedule as part of their curriculum.



Graduation Requirements

<u>All students</u> are required to earn 24 credits to earn a high school diploma including:

- 4 English (ELA)
- 4 Math (must include Algebra and Geometry)
- 3 Science (must include Biology)
- 3 Social Studies (1 World History, 1 US History, .5 Government, .5 Economics)
- 1 Physical Education (.5 Personal Fitness AND .5 any other PE OR 1 credit in HOPE)
- 1 Practical/Performing Art
- 8 electives
- Maintain a 2.0 un-weighted cumulative GPA.

State Assessment Requirements: will update with legislation changes

- Grade 10 English Language Arts ELA (or ACT/SAT/CLT concordant score)
- Algebra I end-of-course (EOC) or comparative score on SAT, ACT, CLT, PSAT, or Geometry EOC

Students must participate in the EOC assessments and the results constitute 30 percent of the final course grade. These assessments are in the following subjects:

- Algebra I
- Geometry
- U.S. History
- · Biology I

Scholar Diploma Designation: In addition to meeting the 24-credit standard high school diploma requirements, a student must:

- Earn 1 credit in Algebra II
- Pass the Geometry EOC
- Earn 1 credit in Statistics or an equally rigorous mathematics course
- Pass the Biology I EOC
- Earn 1 credit in Chemistry or Physics
- Earn 1 credit in a course equally rigorous to Chemistry or Physics
- Pass the U.S. History EOC
- Earn 2 credits in the same World Language
- Earn at least 1 credit in AP, IB, AICE or a dual enrollment course

A student is exempt from the Biology I or U.S. History assessment if the student is enrolled in an AP Biology or U.S. History course and the student

- Takes the respective AP, IB or AICE assessment; and
- Earns the minimum score to earn college credit.

Merit Diploma Designation:

- Meet the standard high school diploma requirements
- Attain one or more industry certifications from the list established (per s. 1003.492, F.S.)

State University Admissions Requirements

Florida universities have a competitive admissions process. The MINIMUM eligibility requirements for admissions are as follows:

Earn a standard diploma with a minimum 2.5 GPA in 18 academic courses which include:

- 4 English
- 4 Math (Algebra 1 and higher level courses)
- 3 Science
- 3 Social Studies
- 2 Foreign Language (in the same language)
- 2 Academic electives

Earn competitive scores on national college entrance exams:

SAT or ACT or CLT

However, students only earning minimum requirements will not gain admissions to most Florida universities. These schools are also looking for a rigorous curriculum, strong GPA with an upward trend, competitive test scores, a well written essay, a passionate commitment to extracurricular activities, and leadership experiences. Each school accepts their most competitive applicants. Bright Futures Scholarships

These scholarships, funded by the Florida Lottery, provide millions of dollars in college

tuition to Florida students. Students who meet the eligibility criteria will earn the scholarship. The State Legislators set the eligibility criteria for the Bright Futures Scholarship programs. The current criteria is listed below but is liable to change during any legislative session. For more information about these scholarships, visit the website at www.floridastudentfinancialaid.org.

Florida Academic Scholars (FAS) and Florida Medallion Scholars (FMS)

Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars (GSV)

- ONLY eligible to receive funding for specific vocational education programs
- Students are required to have a 3.0 overall GPA, a 3.5 GPA in their vocational program
- Complete 3 vocational courses in a vocation program with a minimum 3.5 GPA
- Students are required to have a minimum of 30 documented community service hours

Be prepared! Year-by-Year College and Career Checklist 9th grade

- Know your graduation requirements and monitor your academic progress on www.floridashines.org.
- Begin to think about what you'll do after high school: college, vocational training, field of study. Look at possible careers and education requirements. Visit floridashines.org/find-a-career.
- If you're thinking about college, know the Bright Futures Scholarship Program (www. floridastudentfinancialaid.org) and state university admissions requirements.
- Plan challenging high school courses based on post-secondary plans.
- Consider taking a course on Polk Virtual School or FLVS (www.flvs.net) to explore other areas of interest.
- Maintain good attendance, grades, and citizenship. Take school work seriously because every year and course counts.
- Apply to the Community Service program through Student Services.
- Make a commitment to one or more extracurricular activities. Get involved!
- Create a portfolio (a file or folder). Keep samples of excellent school work, report cards, special awards, letters of commendation, and any other materials that document your successes.
- Take advantage of after school tutoring if needed. Individual teacher assistance is available on Wednesday and Thursday.

10th grade

- Continue to explore possible career options. Begin to gather college information. Utilize internet resources, college websites, and www.floridashines.org.
- Check your academic progress and re-evaluate your course selections.
- Know the admission requirements for universities in which you are interested. What GPA do you need? What SAT or ACT scores do you need? Use Florida Shines and college websites.
- Challenge yourself with honors courses. Consider Advanced Placement courses.
- Take the Preliminary Scholastic Assessment Test (PSAT) given in October. Use the College Board resources with Khan Academy to get personalized feedback, practice and

- college planning based on your PSAT scores on www.collegeboard.com.
- Evaluate your time management skills. Make sure that you have a balance between school, work, and play.
- Maintain good attendance, grades, and citizenship.
- Update your portfolio of achievements.
- Make a commitment to one or more extracurricular activities or a job. Employers and colleges like to see active students.
- If you haven't already done so, begin a savings account for college.
- Look into summer academic programs that might be of interest. Colleges offer many programs.
- Do you want to play college athletics? Talk to your coaches and go to www.eligibility center.org for NCAA information.

11th Grade

- Monitor your academic progress and status toward meeting your requirements. Utilize www.floridashines.org.
- Take the PSAT. This test, and other criteria, could qualify you for a National Merit Scholarship.
- Maintain your portfolio of achievements. Continue to challenge yourself with advanced placement or honors courses.
- Attend college fairs, write or call colleges on your list and visit their websites.

To Addressee or Current Resident

Student Services continues...

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- Review college admissions requirements for colleges you are considering. Don't be afraid to contact these colleges with questions.
- Familiarize yourself with different college pathways. You don't have to start at a 4 year university to earn a 4 year degree. Many state colleges offer direct path university entry within certain majors by following a specific course line up in the first 2 years at the state college.
- Meet with your School Counselor in the spring to review your transcript, plan for your senior year, and discuss a list of colleges you would like to explore.
- Prepare for and take the SAT and/or ACT in the spring. Utilize collegeboard.com and actstudent.org to register and prepare.
- Use your spring and summer breaks to visit college campuses. Call
 ahead or visit college websites to schedule visits. Write a thank you
 note if you participate in an interview.
- Begin thinking about which teachers and others you might ask to write recommendations in the fall of your senior year. Prepare a resume based on the information in your portfolio.
- Maintain good attendance, grades, citizenship, and commitment to extracurricular activities and/or job. Junior year is most important when applying to college!
- Look into summer jobs, volunteer opportunities, or academic programs offered at colleges. Find an internship or job shadow in a profession that interests you.

12th Grade

- Continue to work hard. Colleges DO care about your coursework and grades throughout your entire senior year. Don't slack off!
- If you haven't already done so, take the SAT or ACT in the fall for college admissions. Continue to test through the June test dates to

- qualify for Bright Futures.
- Meet with your School Counselor to be sure you are on track for graduation.
- Narrow down your list of colleges: create a file for each one. Prepare
 a schedule for each school showing requirements, deadlines, fees,
 test scores, teacher recommendations, school transcripts, essays,
 and important names/phone numbers.
- Apply for admissions early in the fall. Write essays and ask teachers to write recommendations when needed. Which schools require a SSAR (self-reported student academic record) and which require a transcript? Students don't submit a transcript to colleges using the SSAR until they are accepted and decide that's the college they will be attending. Watch deadlines!
- Research and apply for financial aid and scholarships. Look for our scholarship bulletin and visit our website at www.georgejenkinshigh. polkschoolsfl.com
- After October 1, complete the Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA) that includes the Bright Futures scholarship program at www.floridastudentfinancialaid.org.
- After October 1, fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). This application is your first foot in the financial aid door of the college you chosen to attend. For help, *attend the Financial Aid night at GJHS*.
- Check your email for admission decisions. Pay close attention to acceptance deadlines. Also watch for information from the college of your choice on housing, orientation, summer academic programs, and other information that will help with your transition to college.
- Graduate! Congratulations!!!
