We've already completed the 1st quarter of the 2019-2020 school year! The 2nd quarter will end on December 20th. Students should be working hard to earn the best semester grades possible. Only semester grades are posted to student's academic records and included in their cumulative GPA. End of Course Exam (EOC's) will be given in Algebra 1, Geometry, Biology, and US History in May and will count as 30% of the course grade. Grades in these courses will be re-calculated with semester 1 grade (35%), semester 2 grade (35%), and the EOC grade (30%) for one final course grade at the end of the year.

Students should be taking advantage of assistance offered by teachers and Eagle to Eagle peer tutoring. All teachers are available in their classrooms after school on Wednesdays and Thursdays to help their students. Eagle to Eagle tutoring is available on Mondays and Tuesdays, 2:15-3:15, in room 19-210. Parents, be sure to take advantage of the information accessible through Parent Portal. Check student's grades, missing assignments, attendance, graduation progress and more. Parents can also email their student's teachers for the most efficient communication. When first setting up a Parent Portal account, parents must visit the front office or the Guidance Office for the activation PIN. Students can obtain their student portal login ID and password from any of their teachers.



Important Test Information

The Florida Standards Assessments (FSA) for Writing, Reading, Algebra and Geometry and the Pearson Assessments (NGSSS) for Biology and US History will be administered beginning April 1, 2020.

End of Course Exams (EOCs) in Algebra, Geometry, Biology and US History will count as 30% of the entire course grade. This means it will affect the first semester grade. Students who do not take their EOC will receive a Zero (0).

Students will have an opportunity to participate in a practice test to become familiar with the computer-based testing platform, item types, and response formats he or she will see on the FSA and Pearson assessments. Computer-based practice tests can be reviewed at home at the following links: http://www.FSAssessments.org/students-and-families/practice-tests/ and http://download.pearsonaccessnext.com/fl/fl-practicetest.html?links=true.

Testing Policies:

- Electronic Devices—Students are not permitted to have any electronic devices, including, but not limited to, cell phones, smartphones, smartwatches, Bluetooth devices (including headphones and earbuds) at any time during testing or during breaks (e.g., restroom), even if the devices are turned off or students do not use them. If a student is found with an electronic device, his or her test will be invalidated.
- Calculators—For Algebra and Geometry EOC assessments Approved hand held calculators are allowed only
 on Session two of the exam. Any student who is found with a hand held calculator during Session 1 will have
 their test invalidated. GJHS will provide hand held calculators for Session 2 of these EOCs. There is also an
 online calculator available. An example of this calculator can be found at https://fsassessments.org/resources/eoc/
- **Testing Rules Acknowledgment**—All tests include a Testing Rules Acknowledgment that reads: "I understand the testing rules that were just read to me. If I do not follow these rules, my test score may be invalidated." Prior to testing, test administrators read the rules to students, and students acknowledge that they understand the testing rules.
- Discussing Test Content after Testing—The last portion of the testing rules read to students states: "Because the content of all statewide assessments is secure, you may not discuss or reveal details about the test content (including test items, passages, and prompts) after the test. This includes any type of electronic communication, such as texting, emailing, or posting online, for example, on Facebook, Twitter, Snapchat, or Instagram." Please understand that "discussing" test content includes any kind of electronic communication, such as texting, emailing, posting to social media, or sharing online. While students may not share information about secure test content after testing, this policy is not intended to prevent students from discussing their testing experiences with their parents/families.
- Working Independently—Students are responsible for doing their own work during the test and for protecting their answers from being seen by others. If students are caught cheating during testing, their tests will be invalidated. In addition, the Florida Department of Education (FDOE) employs Caveon Test Security to analyze student test results to detect unusually similar answer patterns. Student tests within a school that are found to have extremely similar answer patterns will be invalidated.
- Leaving Campus—If a student leaves campus before completing a test session (e.g., for lunch, an appointment, illness), he or she will not be allowed to return to that test session. If a student does not feel well on the day of testing, it may be best for him or her to wait and be tested on a make-up day. Please remember not to schedule appointments on testing days.
- Testing Accommodations—If a student has an Individual Education Plan (IEP), a Section 504 Plan, or is an English Language Learner (ELL), the student will be provided the accommodations as stated in his/her plan.

Please review the test dates and May calendar on the next page. Make up test dates are not guaranteed as most students will be taking more than one test. FSA tests are two sessions over two days. May 6, 7, 12, and 13 - Juniors and Seniors will be excused from school on these days only with prior parental written consent.

Jenkin's Reach Higher Polk! College and Career Week

The Reach Higher initiative is a nationwide effort to inspire students to pursue education beyond high school. Our Reach Higher Polk! Week inspires to do the same in Polk County and took place November 18th - 22nd. This year, our GJ theme is 2020 Vision to your Future inspiring students to think about their life after high school.

This 2020 Vision to your Future week focused on exploring careers and their education pathways including college, technical school, and military. ENN showcased videos each day. Roundtables during lunches provided students with opportunities to talk with college, technical, and military representatives along with financial information and future employment opportunities including Publix and Career Source Polk. The goal is to help students make more informed decisions about the post-secondary options. Graduates take one of five pathways after high school: 4 year college/university, 2+2 State College System, technical college, military, or full time employment.

State Universities: State Universities have a competitive selection process. To be eligible for admissions to a state university, a student must meet these requirements:

1. Earn a standard high school diploma with a minimum of 18 core academic courses which are:

- 4 English
- 4 math (Alg I & higher)
- 3 natural science
- 3 social studies
- 2 in the same foreign language
- 2 academic electives
- Earn scores in reading, math and writing on one of two nationally-recognized college entrance exams: SAT or ACT.

 - ACT actstudent.org

Admissions is based on the university calculated weighted GPA (academic core courses only), admission test scores, and course selection. The more competitive universities, such as UF, FSU, UCF, and USF, are looking for students with 21 or more academic courses and a rigorous course selection. Students seeking university admissions are advised to take additional academic courses such as Psychology, Sociology, Advanced Placement, higher level sciences, and the 3rd and 4th years of foreign language.

Students are encouraged to use FloridaShines @ www.floridashines.org when exploring post-secondary education plans. The State University System of Florida and the Florida College System includes 12 public universities and 28 public state colleges with hundreds of campus locations. At floridashines.org, students can search these colleges for degrees, majors, locations, tuition, size, admission requirements, and more.

State Colleges & Florida's 2+2 System: State colleges have an "open door" admissions process. To be eligible for admission to a state college, a student must earn a standard high school diploma (or equivalent). Florida is nationally-recognized for its highly effective articulation between these state colleges and universities. For instance, in Florida's 2+2 System, students:

- Can complete the two-year Associate in Arts (AA) degree at a Florida College System institution.
- Are guaranteed admission with an AA to at least one of the SUS or baccalaureategranting Florida College System institutions.
- Do not need to complete any additional general education requirements to complete the baccalaureate degree.

Florida is strengthening this 2+2 articulation agreement. Universities have partnered with their state colleges to provide direct pathways with specific course work that leads into their university programs. These programs include Direct Connect to UCF and FUSE at University of South Florida.

Technical College: With the high costs of college and the majority of jobs NOT requiring a 4 year degree, the smartest choice may be less college. However, some post-secondary education will push students into the higher paying jobs that are in high demand. The Florida College System which includes Polk State College offers Associate of Science (2 yr. degrees), Certification Programs and Technical Diplomas in many of the fastest growing career fields. For more information, visit or polk.edu or www.floridacollegesystem.com/info. Other options are career & technical colleges which include our local Traviss Technical College and Ridge Technical College. These programs include career training in Fire Fighting, Automotive Repair & Service Technology, Construction, Dental Assisting, Electricity, and even some medical programs including Medical Coding, Practical Nursing, and Phlebotomy.

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Military options: Through many different branches of the military, there are a huge variety of career options available to high school graduates. Each branch has different requirements for age, physical condition, and education. With five branches including Army, Marines, Navy, Air Force, and Coast Guard, there are full time and part time options. The first step is meeting with a recruiter. This recruiter contact can often be made on our campus during lunches or through our ROTC program. Interested student will also need to take the ASVAB. This is a multiple-aptitude test that measures abilities across several subject areas. Minimum scores are required to be eligible for enlistment in different military branches or for certain jobs within the service. The ASVAB is administered at GJHS every November. For more information go to www.todaysmilitary.com.

Full time employment: While post-secondary education is recommended and needed for higher paying jobs, there are still many careers that offer dependable pay, job growth, and retirement options while only requiring a high school diploma. These jobs often require on the job training, apprenticeships, or state licensure. Some students pursue full time employment to gain life experience, explore career options, or start saving to pay for college. Mrs. VanCamp, our Success Coach, often works with these students to expose them opportunities like our Publix job fair and Polk State College's Earn & Learn program.

Money for College

Colleges have been researched, applications carefully completed, and the wait for acceptance notifications has begun. So while waiting...let's talk money! FloridaShines refers to "financial aid" as money provided by a third party to help students meet the costs of attending college. With most colleges and universities, the financial aid process begins with completing the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). Four types of financial aid are scholarships, grants, loans, and work-study.

Scholarships are free money that does not have to be paid back. They come from a
variety of sources including federal, state, institution, companies, and individuals.
This money can be awarded based on academic achievement, financial need,
athletics, programs of study, or other background factors. Each scholarship sets its
own criteria and application process. Information on Florida scholarships, including

- the Bright Futures Scholarship, can be found at www.floridastudentfinancialaid.org.
 Grants are also free money that does not have to be paid back. They are usually awarded based on financial need, college cost of attendance, and/or enrollment status.
- Loans are money that is borrowed and must be paid back. Student loan programs
 offer long term, low interest education loans which generally do not have to be
 paid back until they graduate. Loans should be used as a last resort but can be used
 as an affordable way to finance education. Federal loans require the completion
 of the FAFSA.
- *Work-study* is when the student works to pay for their education. This employment can be for the school or community business. Some work study positions are obtained after completing the FAFSA and working with the financial aid office at their college.

Remember... Never pay for a scholarship!!! Beware of scams! Never pay for a scholarship search service and never give out your social security number. When you win a scholarship, the provider will ask for your social security number, as this is required by the IRS for tax reporting purposes. Educate yourself at www.ftc.gov/scholarshipscams.

Bright Futures and Financial Aid Night

Jenkins's Financial Aid night was a huge success!! We served over 400 students and parents who came to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) with special help from Financial Aid Advisors from Polk State, Florida Polytechnic University, Florida Southern College, Southeastern University, and Keiser University (Lakeland Campus). Seniors, if you missed this opportunity to get help completing your FAFSA, the application can be found at fafsa.ed.gov. There are several very informative YouTube videos that take this application step by step. This FAFSA is the first step in the financial aid process. Most university priority financial aid deadlines are in the fall which means the FAFSA must be completed by then, and even with local state colleges, the earlier the better. Over \$24 billion of financial aid goes unclaimed each year, so seniors, don't miss this opportunity to find money for college. And juniors, make sure your mark your calendars for October of next year!



Florida Bright Futures information for the Class of 2020: Applications opened October 1st. Counselors met with seniors during financial aid night and in Government and Economics courses to assist students in completing the Florida Financial Aid Application. Students who missed this opportunity are encouraged to complete their application at www.floridastudentfinancialaid.org. The application requires students to enter correct names, social security numbers, and birth dates. This information MUST match what GJHS has in our system in order for the application to be processed.

All students can check their Bright Futures status by logging into their FloridaShines account. On www.floridashines.org under 'Pay for College' and Bright Futures, click 'Check now'. Students use their Social Security number plus an 'X' (### ## #####x) or their student ID (5300######) to access their academic history. FloridaShines information is reliable, secure, and free for Florida students. For more information, please visit www.floridastudentfinancialaid.org. Residency in the State of Florida is mandatory for this scholarship and must be used in the State of Florida.

<u>PSAT</u>

For sophomores and juniors who took the PSAT/NMSQT, score reports will be emailed to students in December. Students should use the email link to access their PSAT score reports and connect to Khan Academy for individualized test preparation. The PSAT score report will show projected SAT scores. Each question can be reviewed, see the correct and incorrect answer, and view explanations of the correct answers. By setting up an account on Khan Academy and connecting it to the College Board PSAT account, students will get personalized practice for the SAT with hundreds of practice questions.
