

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



What's Happening in Art!!

Congratulations are due to 2 of our Sebastian artists who were highlighted in the February issue of Narrow Magazine. Applications were collected from performing and visual arts teachers for outstanding young performers/artists. Ms. Selena Zheng and Ms. LaniRei Decker were chosen to represent Sebastian in the STArt Young section of the magazine.

The Narrow Magazine highlights Music and Arts in Northeast Florida and Gainesville. Ms. Sway DiFeo is the Managing Editor of Narrow Magazine and founder of STArt Now (a nonprofit organization established to support local artists and musicians of Saint Augustine). Ms. Kelly King and Ms. Heather Hagy have both been featured artists in the Narrow. Students were taught about Op Art – which includes Optical Illusions, Contrast and Vanishing Points. Then using some guided prompts, conducted their own research and problem solved to draw and design their own Op ART. These are student examples from Ms. King's and Ms. Hagy's classroom.



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NASA Visit Via ZOOM

Students in Mrs. DeAcutis's 2nd and 4th period 6th grade Intensive Reading class are working with Tyler Hines from NASA to create an Out-of-this-World Vacation experience. The students participated in a Zoom call and learned about the various rockets, missions, and theories for space travel and tourism in the present day and in the future (near future). This project is working in conjunction with an informational reading story called "Out-of- this-World Vacation". Students are doing some research and using a bit of their imaginations to create their own Vacation. The students will present their final presentation to Mr. Hines at a later date.



Reading Plus Competition - STEAMPunk Scavenger Hunt

Critical Thinking, Unique Skills and Intensive Reading classes are participating in a reading competition to improve their reading comprehension skills. During March and April, students will be working on their combo Reading Plus quest. Throughout the competition, students will be awarded spontaneous prizes. The top two classes with the highest percentage of Reading Plus combos at the end of the six week competition will win a class party. At the end of the competition, the top 30 students with Reading Plus Combos will participate in an all day STEAMPunk Scavenger Hunt. The school



has teamed up with 13 Keys Scavenger Hunt, a local business to create a STEAM themed adventure quest for students. Students will receive t-shirts with the theme, have a Chic-Fil-A lunch and participate in the scavenger hunt earning keys as they solve the puzzle. The scavenger hunt will take place in late April.

Immunizations Needed for Rising 7th Graders by August 16, 2021

Don't wait until the last minute! The Tdap immunization shot is required for all 7th graders and must be recorded on a Florida 680 form. As soon as your student receives this shot, the form can be dropped off at the SMS Front Office, faxed to 904-547-3845, or emailed to e008104@stjohns.k12.fl.us. If the school does not receive a record of this immunization by August 16, 2021, your student will not be allowed to attend school. If you do not have a family physician, services are available at the St. Johns County Health Department. Please call (904) 209-3250 for hours and location. Music News

This month the students in all the music classes have been working on small group performance projects. Students have separated into small groups that consist anywhere between two to eight students. The students were given guidelines on how to do research and find a piece for their group. Music that was chosen was to be at their level of playing and was to be prepared for a class performance at the end of March. Each group chose a team leader who would guide the players as they rehearse for their performance. Students have worked together in all aspects of the project, including music selection, practicing, critiquing, and making appropriate changes. This can be challenging, as many of the pieces chosen are multi-part compositions which take a lot of effort on the student's part to prepare. My job has been to rotate between groups and give input where needed. I have had a blast watching these students put this together. They are very serious about this project and it is amazing to see their pieces develop. I am looking forward to hearing their small group performances at the end of the month.

The decision to hold Summer Music Camps has not been decided yet, but watch your weekly Principal's messages for information. Typically, the camps are for students who have had previous music instruction to further develop their musical skills for the coming school year and have fun! Activities usually include concert rehearsal techniques, performance fundamentals, improving technical skills, improvisation, and developing musicianship.

Classes typically available during the camp include:

- String Orchestra
- Band
- Guitar

As soon as we have word on if the camp will commence, it will be announced on the website and in the Principal's weekly newsletter.

Homeless Community Project Reflection Assignment

In February Ms. Taylors' students in the gifted elective class created a project that was inspired by an organization in Austin, Texas called Mobile Loaves & Fishes. That organization created a community to help alleviate chronic homelessness called Community First Village.

After identifying homelessness as an issue in our own community, we analyzed some recent legislation put in to place to curb panhandling, as well as, researched community resources available to those who are currently homeless or on the brink of being homeless. Many students were able to recognize access to affordable housing as being a barrier to getting out of homelessness, as St. Johns County is the fastest growing county in our state. That's where we began looking for ways to keep these individuals as a part of our community and found the Community First Village.

The students were tasked with designing their own 40-acre community with housing for 150. They used free online software to design interiors of the tiny homes and then created scaled models of their communities out of cardboard. A Zoom call with Mobile Loaves & Fishes President/Founder and a few of their in-house architects was completed on February 22nd. Our students were excited to share their work and let them know how inspiring it was to learn about the Community First Village.

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Inquiry Hour = Project Based Learning During the Pandemic

From now until the end of the year, students will be participating in a modified Inquiry Hour in their regular classes. Inquiry Hour was created at Sebastian Middle School to offer authentic project-based learning experiences to all students. Every SMS teacher will be running an inquiry-based project within their classes and student presentations will be scored using a common rubric that was developed by SMS students and teachers. A virtual exhibition will be held to showcase our students' hard work toward the end of the year. We look forward to returning to our normal Inquiry Hour program during the 2021-2022 school year.

A few samples of projects that students are working on include:

Ms. Watson's Class

Her advanced honors students are wrapping up the unit on the structure and function of cells. They are creating attractions for their new town, Watsonville. These attractions will run similar to how a cell works within our body. Since the cell unit is a large unit, they have broken their project into two pieces. First, they will be building the structure/function of the cell. After they learn how their cells stay balanced, students will be explaining & comparing how their attraction/cell keeps balanced and what would happen if some portion of their attraction didn't do their job. What would happen?



The Catapult Challenge - Ms. Sarah Burkhardt & Mr. Rob O'Neil

Working in teams, students will brainstorm ideas and concepts to build a catapult that will complete three tests to determine the winning design. Students will use supplies such as magazines, popsicle sticks, masking tape, scissors, plastic cups, soda or soup cans, rubber bands, plastic spoons. Once students have built their catapults, it is time to launch! There will be three stations and students will record results as they go. They will be measuring Accuracy - by launching cotton balls/marshmallows towards a bowl (the target). They also will be measuring the Power of their catapult by measuring the distance of the flung marshmallow and lastly, they will measure the Strength of their catapult. They will attempt to knock over a tower of small plastic cups with the impact of their shot. Each Catapult is graded on how well it does in all three stations and a winning team will be declared.

Math Connection

A great part of the catapult challenge is the ease of adding math to the activity. For the Algebra students: they will learn how the quadratic functions for time, distance, and maximum height work while using their catapults in the Testing Station. For the Geometry students: they will learn about how shapes (circle, squares, rectangles...etc.) help in the design and building of the catapults.

Mr. Raimann Tasked His Students The Following:

Aerospace STEAM Classes - Aircraft Design Challenge - As an engineer, you are going to be designing, building and testing model airplanes. The purpose of your work is to experiment with different engineering ideas. You will need to find the best way to use and combine different materials to meet certain goals. The goal is to design three airplanes: one to fly the fastest, one to fly the farthest and one to fly the longest. There are several scientific ideas related to forces and motion that you could think about when designing. After your testing, you will then present your designs to a company that is interested in designing new planes for their fleet.

6TH Grade Science - Minecraft Cell City - Students working in groups of 3-5 were given the task to build a city. Each building will represent a different cell part: nucleus; cytoplasm; mitochondria; membrane: chloroplasts; cell wall; vacuole. The students added an identifying sign next to each building stating the name of that building and the name of the cell part the building represents. They will then create a multimedia presentation taking the audience through a tour of their cell city.

The students will present their work to the class and explain their model. Each team member will evaluate every other team members' collaboration.



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
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Media Center News

The St. Johns County Middle School Battle of the Books was held virtually this year. The competing members were Gregory Rorex (team captain), Graci Flaherty, Brooklyn Anthony, Taylor Pelchat, Hannah Vickery, Glamorous Spicer, and Sophia Barnard. Alternates were Emily Tobuck and Andy Birchall. Our supporting members were Bianca Allie, Anna Lusk, and Kai Hulbert. 10 middle schools and K8 academies competed through Zoom hosted by the district's Instructional Resources and Media Services. This year, Patriot Oaks was able to score 44 out of 45 points, becoming this year's champion. SMS scored 38 points, beating out Gamble Rogers. The team did an amazing job from missing 4 questions during the first round to only missing 1 question during the last round. Battle of the Books is an annual competition of knowledge of the 15 Sunshine State Young Readers Award books. Every year, the Sebastian Media Center gives incentives for reading these books from brag tags to gift bags to a final celebration for those who have read all 15 books.




Literacy Week was the last of January. The Media Center hosted several events from guessing a mystery reader, to dress up days that included wearing a hat to "Hats off to Authors" and a Cosplay Day in which students dressed as their favorite literary character, virtual meet and greet of the SSYRA authors, and a rousing game of Match the Teacher to their favorite book. We also had a book themed door decorating contest. Ms. Kirby-Allie's homeroom won 1st Place and Ms. King won Best in Show. Ms. deCastro won a gift basket for being the staff member to guess the most teachers to their favorite book.



Sebastian Middle School was one of 3 middle schools to receive a grant through The Players and Character County St. Johns to receive a collection of books from the Project Lit initiative. Project Lit is a nationwide movement to get books that are diverse, culturally relevant, and high interest into the hands of students. Every year books are chosen to be a part of this collection. We received 26 books that include the titles: Free Lunch, Efen Divided, Like Vanessa, and Genesis Begins Again. We also received a class set of Tristan Strong Punches a Hole in the Sky that Unique Skills will be reading to base their inquiry hour project.



Unique Skills has teamed up with the Media Center for an Inquiry Hour project based on a novel study on *Tristan Strong Punches a Hole in the Sky* by Kwame Mbalia. Students researched the African American folk legends in the story then will create a board game based on the obstacles in the story. Student game options can include board games to digital options such as Minecraft.



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
